From the Pastor's Desk

A Model Family

I want to begin by wishing everyone a Merry Christmas and a wonderful New Year in advance. I thank God for the opportunity to celebrate the Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Masses with you. In his 2021 Christmas message, Pope Francis says, "What is Christmas? Is it a tree? A statue of a baby with a woman and a man nearby? Yes, it is Jesus, the birth of Jesus. Stop for a bit and think of Christmas as a message, a message of peace." This message and its light comes to a world darkened by sin, divisions and strife to transform it and our lives.

Christmas brings great beauty. Homes, churches, shops, offices, and streets are beautifully decorated with Christmas trees, wreaths, flowers and lights. Christmas has a greater spiritual meaning if our life is inwardly decorated with the hope, peace, joy, and love we celebrated during the four Sundays of Advent. May this year's Christmas celebration bring us all this things and more.

The celebration of the feast of the Holy Family is of utmost importance to all of us because we all belong to families; and the family is the first and the greatest institution God created. It comes in a unique year when we celebrate Christmas the day before Holy family. Unfortunately, we are passing through a difficult time whereby many families are fractured and hurting in one way or another. There is fear or cases of the Covid/Omicron variant. Our difficult situation is compounded by an increase in instability in families caused by changing family values, and social, political, and economic reasons. Since families are the foundations and the constituents of societies, more fractured, hurting, and unstable families mean more fractured, hurting, and unstable societies.

Just because the family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph was a holy family does not mean that everything was well and smooth for them. It was a lowly family with many ups and downs; but they held together in all their ups and downs. Therefore, the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph is a model for all families. Mary gave birth to Jesus in very difficult circumstances. After a long journey on foot from Nazareth to Bethlehem for the census, a distance of about 100 miles (161 kilometers), there was no inn to lodge in. They went to a shed on a farm where Mary gave birth to Jesus. It was not recorded that any nurse or midwife was available to help. We can only imagine how tough it was for the two of them all alone when Jesus was born. Pope Paul VI describes the Holy Family as a school of Nazareth where we learn the true science of life and the higher wisdom of divine truth. The Holy Family teaches us faith in God and obedience to him. The family teaches us selflessness, sacrifice, forbearance, understanding, harmony, and love.

The first reading for Holy Family reminds us that, "God sets a father in honor over his children; a mother's authority over her [children]." Unfortunately, many parents have handed over this God-given authority to their children. Thus the reverse has become the case: Many children have authority over their parents, and are able to control and manipulate their parents as they wish. There is no perfect family. Turning on one another and violence to one another only make matters worse. St. Paul encourages us in the second reading of Sunday about how to cope with family imperfections in order to avoid disorderliness, instability, breakdowns, and disintegrations: "Put on ... heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another. ... And over all these put on love And let the peace of Christ control your hearts, ... And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, as in all wisdom you teach and admonish one another, singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or in deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus..." (Colossians 3:12-17). We can see here that St. Paul encourages families to pray together. "A family that prays together stays together."

Desde el Escritorio del Pastor

Una Familia Modelo

Quiero comenzar deseándoles a todos una Feliz Navidad y un maravilloso Año Nuevo de antemano. Doy gracias a Dios por la oportunidad de celebrar las misas de Nochebuena y Navidad con ustedes. En su mensaje de Navidad de 2021, el Papa Francisco dice: "¿Qué es la Navidad? Es un arbol ¿Una estatua de un bebé con una mujer y un hombre cerca? Sí, es Jesús, el nacimiento de Jesús. Deténgase un momento y piense en la Navidad como un mensaje, un mensaje de paz ". Este mensaje y su luz llega a un mundo oscurecido por el pecado, las divisiones y las luchas para transformarlo y nuestras vidas.

La Navidad trae una gran belleza. Las casas, iglesias, tiendas, oficinas y calles están bellamente decoradas con árboles de Navidad, coronas, flores y luces. La Navidad tiene un mayor significado espiritual si nuestra vida está decorada interiormente con la esperanza, la paz, la alegría y el amor que celebramos durante los cuatro domingos de Adviento. Que la celebración navideña de este año nos traiga todas estas cosas y más.

La celebración de la fiesta de la Sagrada Familia es de suma importancia para todos nosotros porque todos pertenecemos a familias; y la familia es la primera y más grande institución que Dios creó. Llega en un año único cuando celebramos la Navidad el día antes de la Sagrada Familia. Desafortunadamente, estamos atravesando un momento difícil en el que muchas familias están fracturadas y sufriendo de una forma u otra. Hay miedo o casos de la variante Covid / Omicron. Nuestra difícil situación se ve agravada por un aumento de la inestabilidad en las familias causada por los cambios en los valores familiares y por razones sociales, políticas y económicas. Dado que las familias son los cimientos y los componentes de las sociedades, familias más fracturadas, heridas e inestables significan sociedades más fracturadas, heridas e inestables.

El hecho de que la familia de Jesús, María y José fuera una familia sagrada no significa que todo estuvo bien para ellos. Era una familia humilde con muchos altibajos; pero se mantuvieron unidos en todos sus altibajos. Por tanto, la Sagrada Familia de Jesús, María y José es un modelo para todas las familias. María dio a luz a Jesús en circunstancias muy difíciles. Después de un largo viaje a pie desde Nazaret a Belén para el censo, una distancia de aproximadamente 161 kilómetros, no había posada donde alojarse. Fueron a un cobertizo en una granja donde María dio a luz a Jesús. No se registró que ninguna enfermera o partera estuviera disponible para ayudar. Solo podemos imaginar lo difícil que fue para los dos solos cuando nació Jesús. El Papa Pablo VI describe la Sagrada Familia como una escuela de Nazaret donde aprendemos la verdadera ciencia de la vida y la sabiduría superior de la verdad divina. La Sagrada Familia nos enseña la fe en Dios y la obediencia a él. La familia nos enseña altruismo, sacrificio, tolerancia, comprensión, armonía y amor.

La primera lectura de la Sagrada Familia nos recuerda que, "Dios pone a un padre en honor sobre sus hijos; la autoridad de una madre sobre sus [hijos] ". Desafortunadamente, muchos padres han entregado esta autoridad dada por Dios a sus hijos. Por lo tanto, ha sucedido lo contrario: muchos niños tienen autoridad sobre sus padres y pueden controlar y manipular a sus padres como lo deseen. No existe una familia perfecta. El enfrentarse unos a otros y la violencia entre ellos solo empeoran las cosas. San Pablo nos anima en la segunda lectura del domingo sobre cómo hacer frente a las imperfecciones familiares para evitar el desorden, la inestabilidad, las rupturas y las desintegraciones: "Pónganse ... compasión, bondad, humildad, mansedumbre y paciencia de todo corazón, soportando uno a otro y perdonándose unos a otros. ... Y sobre todo esto ponte amor.... Y dejad que la paz de Cristo controle vuestros corazones... Y sed agradecidos. Dejemos que la palabra de Cristo more en abundancia en ustedes, como con toda sabiduría se enseñan y se exhortan unos a otros, cantando salmos, himnos y cánticos espirituales con gratitud en su corazón a Dios. Y todo lo que hagas, de palabra o de hecho, hazlo todo en el nombre del Señor Jesús..." (Colosenses 3: 12-17). Podemos ver aquí que San Pablo anima a las familias a orar juntas. "Una familia que reza junta, se queda junta."
