From the Pastor's Desk

Our Beast of Burden

Today, Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord, is the sixth and last Sunday of Lent. It commemorates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, days before he was crucified. Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week. The gospel's Passion narrative invites us to participate in the mystery of Jesus' Passion journey.

Almost all Jewish prophets prophesied the coming of the Messiah who would redeem Israel from her oppressors. At the time of Jesus, Israel was governed by the Romans. Jesus' disciples were convinced that Jesus was a political Messiah who would lead a rebellion against the Roman colonial rule and drive them out. Therefore, on arriving in Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover, he was given a rousing and heroic welcome: "The very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and strewed them on the road. The crowds preceding him and those following kept crying out and saying: 'Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest'" (Matthew 21:8-9). In Hebrew, 'hosanna' means, 'save us now.' So, the people were crying, "Save us now, Son of David; you are sent by the Lord, it's high time you save us." Like the crowds, we cry to Jesus to save us from our afflictions.



John 12:13 writes, "They took palm branches and went out to meet him and cried out." It is from this line that this Sunday is named "Palm Sunday." At the time of Jesus, palm branches were considered symbols of victory and triumph by the Jewish people. Unknowingly, the crowds proclaimed Jesus as the Savior of the world who was to triumph and become victorious over death. I do not think that the crowds would have cried to Jesus to save them if they knew that he was not a political Messiah. A few days later, the crowds shouted, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" Could it be that the crowds were frustrated and disappointed that Jesus did not fulfill their expectations? If Jesus had overthrown the Roman leadership, the crowds would have stood behind him. He would not have been crucified. Do we do as the Jews and the crowds did? We get very disappointed, frustrated, and upset when our expectations are not met. Then, we become aggressive and destructive.

As we read in the gospel, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a colt (a young donkey). Jesus chose to enter Jerusalem on a donkey (which was, at that time, the means of transportation for the poor) rather than on a horse (which was the means of transportation for the rich, the high and the mighty). By riding a donkey, a beast of burden, Jesus made himself our 'beast of burden' thereby fulfilling Isaiah 53:54, "He took up our pain and bore our suffering." Like the donkey, Jesus carries our pains and sufferings. By riding a donkey, Jesus identified himself with the poor and the lowly, and he teaches us to do the same. He wants us to identify with the burdened, the needy, the sick, and the suffering. And by riding a donkey, Jesus teaches us the importance of detachment and humility. In Matthew 11:29, Jesus says, "Learn from me for I am gentle and humble in heart."

A blessed palm leaf is not to be thrown around or discarded as trash. It is kept reverently until next year when it is returned to the church to be burned for our use on Ash Wednesday.

Desde el Escritorio del Pastor

Nuestra Bestia de Carga

Hoy, Domingo de Ramos de la Pasión del Señor, es el sexto y último domingo de Cuaresma. Conmemora la entrada triunfal de Jesús en Jerusalén, días antes de ser crucificado. El Domingo de Ramos marca el comienzo de la Semana Santa. El relato de la Pasión del Evangelio nos invita a participar en el misterio del camino de la Pasión de Jesús.

Casi todos los profetas judíos profetizaron la venida del Mesías que redimiría a Israel de sus opresores. En la época de Jesús, Israel estaba gobernado por los romanos. Los discípulos de Jesús estaban convencidos de que Jesús era un Mesías político que lideraría una rebelión contra el dominio colonial romano y los expulsaría. Por eso, al llegar a Jerusalén para celebrar la Pascua, se le dio una entusiasta y heroica acogida: "La muchedumbre muy numerosa tendía sus mantos por el camino, mientras que otros cortaban ramas de los árboles y las tiraban por el camino. Las multitudes que lo precedían y los que lo seguían gritaban y decían: '¡Hosanna al Hijo de David; bendito el que viene en el nombre del Señor; hosanna en las alturas'" (Mateo 21:8-9). En hebreo, 'hosanna' significa, 'sálvanos ahora'. Entonces, la gente clamaba: "Sálvanos ahora, Hijo de David; eres enviado por el Señor, ya es hora de que nos salves". Como las multitudes, clamamos a Jesús para que nos salve de nuestras aflicciones.



Juan 12:13 escribe: "Tomaron ramas de palma y salieron a su encuentro y gritaron". Es de esta línea que este domingo se denomina "Domingo de Ramos". En la época de Jesús, las ramas de palma eran consideradas símbolos de victoria y triunfo por el pueblo judío. Sin saberlo, las multitudes proclamaron a Jesús como el Salvador del mundo que había de triunfar y salir victorioso sobre la muerte. No creo que las multitudes hubieran clamado a Jesús para que los salvara si supieran que él no era un Mesías político. Unos días después, la multitud gritaba: "¡Crucifícalo! ¡Crucifícale! ¿Será que las multitudes estaban frustradas y desilusionadas porque Jesús no cumplió con sus expectativas? Si Jesús hubiera derrocado al liderazgo romano, las multitudes lo habrían apoyado. Él no habría sido crucificado. ¿Hacemos como los judíos y las multitudes? Nos sentimos muy decepcionados, frustrados y molestos cuando no se cumplen nuestras expectativas. Entonces, nos volvemos agresivos y destructivos.

Como leemos en el evangelio, Jesús entró en Jerusalén montado en un pollino (un asno joven). Jesús eligió entrar a Jerusalén en un burro (que era, en ese momento, el medio de transporte de los pobres) en lugar de un caballo (que era el medio de transporte de los ricos, los altos y poderosos). Al montar un burro, una bestia de carga, Jesús se hizo a sí mismo nuestra "bestia de carga", cumpliendo así Isaías 53:54, "Él tomó nuestro dolor y llevó nuestro sufrimiento". Como el burro, Jesús lleva nuestros dolores y sufrimientos. Al montar en un burro, Jesús se identificó con los pobres y los humildes, y nos enseña a hacer lo mismo. Él quiere que nos identifiquemos con los agobiados, los necesitados, los enfermos y los que sufren. Y montado en un burro, Jesús nos enseña la importancia del desapego y la humildad. En Mateo 11:29, Jesús dice: "Aprended de mí que soy manso y humilde de corazón".

Una hoja de palma bendita no debe tirarse ni desecharse como basura. Se guarda con reverencia hasta el próximo año cuando se devuelve a la iglesia para ser quemado para nuestro uso el Miércoles de Ceniza.


Noticias




