From the Pastor's Desk

Happy Easter! Christ is Risen!

Every year the Easter Triduum comes and goes. What makes Easter a special celebration so that we have three days of daily liturgical ceremonies leading to it? First, Easter can be described as the confirmation of the power of our Lord Jesus Christ to rise from the dead, confirming his divinity as well as the hope of resurrection for all believers in Christ Jesus. Second, it confirms that death has no power over Jesus our Lord, who has become our Savior and our Salvation. Third, he is truly our Lord and King, in confirmation of the Palm Sunday event.

The Easter Triduum begins on Holy Thursday night with the Last Supper Mass. On Holy Thursday, Christians celebrate the institution of the Eucharist and the institution of the priesthood to be at the service of the Holy Eucharist, as the Lord did at the Last Supper, (cf. John 13:1-15). By extension, the Church continues the commissions and installations for ministries in the Church for various charitable works, which are also extensions of the washing of feet: "Love one another as I have loved you". It is our celebration of the Passover of the Lord, where Jesus of Nazareth becomes the Lamb of sacrifice for God's holy people, when he gave us his body and blood. It recalls for us the slaughtering of the lambs in Egypt that gave rise to the first Passover of God's people from bondage to freedom, captivity to liberation, slavery to free citizens, (cf. Exodus 12:1-14). Bread and wine were first offered by Melchizedek (cf. Genesis 14:18), and this offering was not continued until Christ the Lord offered it as a new and everlasting covenant in His blood (cf. Mark 14:22-24; Matthew 26:26-28; Luke 22:19-20 & 1 Corinthians 11:23-26). We therefore celebrate the Lord as our new Lamb of sacrifice for everlasting memory. "His blood of the covenant both alludes to the ancient rite of Exodus 24:4-8 and indicates the new community that the sacrifice of Jesus will bring into being." (N.A. Bible Commentary on Mark 14:22-24).



On Good Friday we participate in the ceremonies that re-enact the passion and death of the Lord. On this day Christians mourn for Christ Jesus who died to set us free. His death is seen as our ransom from death. One of our Eucharistic acclamations indicates: "Dying, you destroyed our death, rising, you restored our life. Lord Jesus, come in glory." Good Friday proved the suffering and death of Christ as was predicted by the Old Testament prophets.

The Easter Vigil night is the resurrection night. It is a highly ritual commemoration also and probably the longest celebration of the Eucharist we have in the year. From the Service of Light to the Easter Proclamation (the Exsultet) and the scripture readings, we recall our salvation history. Isaiah 42:6 indicates that God's Servant would be "a light to the nations", and so did Simeon (cf. Luke 2:32). Christ, our Light, that brightens all our darkness, is risen from the dead. The words of the Exsultet of Easter Vigil are worth meditating upon. The Exsultet opens the door to Easter joys. On this night and on Easter Sunday we renew our baptismal promise to recall our re-birth and new life for all believers. The ritual celebrations of the Easter Triduum help us discover or re-discover who the Lord Jesus truly is. He prepared us for his passion, death and resurrection. Christ is risen indeed as he said. Happy Easter to you as you read this reflection! For the next fifty days we will celebrate Easter Season until the feast of Pentecost.

Desde el Escritorio del Pastor

¡Felices Pascuas! ¡Cristo Ha Resucitado!

Cada año el Triduo Pascual va y viene. ¿Qué hace que la Pascua sea una celebración especial para que tengamos tres días de ceremonias litúrgicas diarias que conducen a ella? En primer lugar, la Pascua se puede describir como la confirmación del poder de nuestro Señor Jesucristo para resucitar de entre los muertos, lo que confirma su divinidad y la esperanza de resurrección para todos los creyentes en Cristo Jesús. Segundo, confirma que la muerte no tiene poder sobre Jesús nuestro Señor, quien se ha convertido en nuestro Salvador y nuestra Salvación. Tercero, él es verdaderamente nuestro Señor y Rey, en confirmación del evento del Domingo de Ramos.

El Triduo Pascual comienza la noche del Jueves Santo con la Misa de la Última Cena. El Jueves Santo los cristianos celebran la institución de la Eucaristía y la institución del sacerdocio para estar al servicio de la Sagrada Eucaristía, como lo hizo el Señor en la Última Cena, (cf. Juan 13:1-15). Por extensión, la Iglesia continúa los encargos e instalaciones para ministerios en la Iglesia para diversas obras de caridad, que son también prolongaciones del lavatorio de los pies: “Amaos como yo os he amado”. Es nuestra celebración de la Pascua del Señor, donde Jesús de Nazaret se convierte en el Cordero del sacrificio por el pueblo santo de Dios, cuando nos entrega su cuerpo y su sangre. Nos recuerda el sacrificio de los corderos en Egipto que dio lugar a la primera Pascua del pueblo de Dios de la servidumbre a la libertad, del cautiverio a la liberación, de la esclavitud a los ciudadanos libres (cf. Éxodo 12, 1-14). El pan y el vino fueron ofrecidos por primera vez por Melquisedec (cf. Génesis 14:18), y esta ofrenda no continuó hasta que Cristo el Señor la ofreció como un pacto nuevo y sempiterno en Su sangre (cf. Marcos 14:22-24; Mateo 26, 26-28; Lucas 22:19-20 y 1 Corintios 11:23-26). Por lo tanto, celebramos al Señor como nuestro nuevo Cordero de sacrificio para memoria eterna. “Su sangre del pacto alude al antiguo rito de Éxodo 24:4-8 e indica la nueva comunidad que el sacrificio de Jesús traerá a la existencia”. (N.A. Comentario Bíblico sobre Marcos 14:22-24).

El Viernes Santo participamos en las ceremonias que recrean la pasión y muerte del Señor. En este día los cristianos lloran por Cristo Jesús que murió para liberarnos. Su muerte es vista como nuestro rescate de la muerte. Una de nuestras aclamaciones eucarísticas indica: “Muriendo, destruiste nuestra muerte, resucitando, restauraste nuestra vida. Señor Jesús, ven en gloria”. El Viernes Santo demostró el sufrimiento y la muerte de Cristo como fue predicho por los profetas del Antiguo Testamento.

La noche de la Vigilia Pascual es la noche de la resurrección. Es una conmemoración altamente ritual también y probablemente la celebración más larga de la Eucaristía que tenemos en el año. Desde el Servicio de la Luz hasta el Pregón Pascual (el Exsultet) y las lecturas de las Escrituras, recordamos nuestra historia de salvación. Isaías 42:6 indica que el Siervo de Dios sería “una luz para las naciones”, y así lo hizo Simeón (cf. Lucas 2:32). Cristo, nuestra Luz, que ilumina todas nuestras tinieblas, ha resucitado de entre los muertos. Vale la pena meditar las palabras del Exsultet de la Vigilia Pascual. El Exsultet abre la puerta a las alegrías pascuales. En esta noche y el Domingo de Pascua renovamos nuestra promesa bautismal para recordar nuestro renacimiento y vida nueva para todos los creyentes. Las celebraciones rituales del Triduo Pascual nos ayudan a descubrir o redescubrir quién es verdaderamente el Señor Jesús. Él nos preparó para su pasión, muerte y resurrección. Cristo ha resucitado en verdad como dijo. ¡Feliz Pascua para ti mientras lees esta reflexión! Durante los próximos cincuenta días celebraremos el Tiempo Pascual hasta la fiesta de Pentecostés.





Divine Mercy Chaplet – April 16 – 3:00 pm

In Jesus' revelations to Saint Faustina on the Divine Mercy, ***He asked that a feast day be dedicated to the Divine Mercy on the Sunday after Easter.*** This Feast was granted to the Universal Church by Pope John Paul II on the occasion of the canonization of Sr. Faustina on April 30, 2000 as a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the trials that mankind will experience in the years to come. ***This is the highest endorsement that the Church can give to a private revelation,*** an act of papal infallibility proclaiming the certain sanctity of the mystic, and the granting of a universal feast.

Concerning the Feast of Mercy Jesus said: Whoever approaches the Fountain of Life on this day will be granted complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. (Diary 300).

A plenary indulgence can be gained by visiting a church on Divine Mercy Sunday, praying the Divine Mercy devotion, and the usual conditions of Confession, Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Pope.
